May is Melanoma Awareness Month

Melanoma is one type of skin cancer and is much less common than basal cell and squamous cell skin cancers. Melanoma is an especially dangerous type of skin cancer because it is more likely to spread beyond the skin to other organs and areas of the body.

Melanoma can develop on any part of the skin, but certain areas are more prone to the development of melanoma than others. Men are more prone to develop melanoma on the chest and back. Women are more prone to develop melanoma on the legs.

Avoiding overexposure to the sun, and taking steps to prevent sunburns, are highly important in lowering the risk of skin cancer. Also, knowing the ABCDE's of melanoma is very important:

- Asymmetric: normal moles are typically round and symmetrical, cancerous moles are not.
- Border: irregular scalloped borders are more concerning.
- Color: melanomas are not always one color, but can contain uneven shades including black, brown, tan, and even blue.
- Diameter: melanoma lesions are usually larger than 6mm in diameter (about the size of a pencil eraser).
- Evolving: a change in a mole's appearance over a period of weeks, or months could be a sign of skin cancer.

Melanoma KILLS 1 person each HOUR!! Tanning booths are not a safe alternative to being out in the sun. Fifteen minutes in a tanning bed is equal to a whole day's exposure at the beach. Don't be one of the 10's of thousands of cases diagnosed each year.

Apply sunscreen, seek shade when you can, avoid mid-day hours from the sun, and get regular skin checks.

What Happens After You Have a Biopsy?

What happens after you have a biopsy? Do you go home and forget about it thinking that the doctor's office will take care of it and call you back? Do you go home and create a reminder in your personal calendar to call your doctor's office and check for results in a couple weeks? I hope you answered "yes" to the second question. Once you have a biopsy, we ask that you go home and mark your calendar two weeks out. If you have not heard back from us in that time frame, then we ask that you call us to check on the results.

Once your biopsy has been taken, a courier from the outside lab will stop by our office to pick it up. The courier delivers the container with your specimen to the lab where the pathologist processes the tissue and gets it ready to review under the microscope. The pathologist then reviews your specimen and makes a diagnosis. The laboratory will then send us the report with the final diagnosis. On average it takes 3 to 4 days to get a result. Sometimes the pathologist cannot make a diagnosis so they may request that another pathologist review the specimen and give their opinion. The pathologist may also need to run some special tests on the specimen which can take several days to weeks to receive the final result.

Once we have the final diagnosis report, Dr. Carruth or Lisa Matuga, PA-C will then review the report and come up with a treatment plan if needed. The Medical Assistants will then call you with the results. The whole process should take between 7 and 10 days, but it can sometimes take longer. Please make sure to mark your personal calendars for two weeks after your biopsy to follow up with us if you have not heard from us.
